#### Financial Storm Clouds Approaching


Demographic shifts will have a sizable impact on government bodies nation-wide.

Sask seniors as a percentage of working age people (15-64):

**2010: 22%** 

2036: 39%

### Financial Storm Clouds Approaching

Each year the federal government releases a "Fiscal Sustainability Report" – a document that looks at long-term expenses and revenues while incorporating demographic changes.

The 2014 report estimated an annual \$34 billion shortfall between future provincial and municipal revenues and expenses nation-wide. Province-by-province analysis is not reported.







#### Financial Storm Clouds Approaching

We asked the SK
Ministry of Finance for similar analysis but were told none exists.

#### **Recommendation 1**:

Conduct and release annual analysis on long-term fiscal sustainability.

### **Health Care Choice**

A 2013 report by the Canadian Institute of Actuaries concluded that unless significant health reform is enacted, health spending will represent 103% of provincial revenues by 2037.

Clearly health care reform is <u>not</u> an option, but a necessity.





### **Health Care Choice**

The CTF is fully behind the Premier's musings to allow people to purchase private MRI services. It would be:

- Good for patients
- Good for those who remain on the waiting list
- Good for the Sask economy

**Recommendation 2:** Keep the public system, but allow private businesses to provide <u>any</u> licensed health service.





### Pension Reform

Government employee pensions are a mixed bag in Sask. While MLAs have a <u>reasonable type of plan</u>, many other divisions still have golden plans:

Defined-Contribution	<b>Defined Benefit</b>
MLAs	Judges
Ministry employees	Most municipal employees
Crown employees	Health employees
New teachers	Some post-sec plans



### Pension Reform

Many government plans are receiving huge bailouts.

Eg. Government spending on Saskatchewan Healthcare Employees Pension Plan (SHEPP):

2006: \$76 million

2013: \$147 million

That's a 94% increase in just seven years... on top of pay increases provided to employees!





# 3 Pension Reform

**Recommendation 3:** Start putting new employees in less costly, defined-contribution pensions.

**Recommendation 4:** No more bailouts for existing employees. Defined-benefit plans should have to make due with available funds/contributions. (Eg. target

benefit)



### **Alcohol Sales Reform**

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation has advocated for privatizing alcohol sales reform for years.

This December we surveyed our supporters and found:

- \* 49% Support Alberta approach
- \* 22% Close inefficient government-run stores
- \* 10% Support status quo
- \* 9% Want more government involvement
- \* 8% Privatize, but limit store licenses







### **Alcohol Sales Reform**

#### Also worth noting:

67% - Do not want another dollar spent on liquor stores

23% - It's reasonable for the government to spend money on store openings, renovations & other purposes

**Recommendation 5**: Pursue Alberta model for alcohol sales reform





#### **Bureaucratic Bloat**

The CTF is pleased the provincial government has worked hard to reduce the number of ministry employees.

However, Saskatchewan still leads the country in terms of government employment.

- Gainsharing, managed competition/contracting out
