Methodology



Method

Canadian online survey via Leger's LEO panel, with n=1527 Canadian residents aged 18+.

When

The weekly online omnibus was in field from the 24th to the 26th of January 2025, inclusive, using Leger's online panel, LEO.

Margin of error

For comparison purposes, a probability sample of this size (n=1527) yields a margin of error no greater than $\pm 2.1\%$, (19 times out of 20)

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
Detailed Results







Majority (60%) believe that the next Liberal Party leader should take a stance against the carbon tax.

Only 19% believe the next Liberal Party leader should support the carbon tax, with higher support among Quebec residents (25% vs. 17% outside Quebec) and urban dwellers. Conversely, opposition to the carbon tax is more prevalent among men older adults, those outside of Quebec, and rural residents.









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When the unsure are excluded, 91% of Conservatives and over four-in-ten Green and Liberal Party voters believe that the next Liberal Party leader should oppose the carbon tax.
